Following letter is sent to you for the favour of publica
in your esteemed Paper, as it touches the current topic of the
Gandhi-Jinnah Meeting.

"Gandhi-Jinnah Meeting is being anxiously awaited by all
of the public in India. It has drawn attention of all
the world over. Whether the meeting by itself will lead
to freedom or not, cannot be said, but it is certain that the
is bound to have far-reaching effects on not only inter-
national relations but also on Indo-British relations and on the
struggle for Indian freedom. The responsibility, therefore, of this
great sons of India is heavy indeed.

In view of this heavy responsibility and far-reaching
consequences, visibly affecting the Indian People it is necessary
that a procedure be adopted in the conduct of the negotiation
in the event of its failure the points of agreement and
disagreement are clearly and unambiguously brought out for the
eyes of the public at large, enabling it to form its own judge-
ment. In the event of its success door should be kept
open for adjustment so that the agreed formula be placed before an
Assembly Convention for consideration and approval. It can be
safely hoped that with Gandhi-Jinnah endorsement there
will be no major hitch from freedom-loving quarters.

However an important issue deserves attention of all.
It has been pointed out by Mr. Jinnah that the Unity Talks on the
basis of Rajaji's formula cannot be conclusive without the agreement
on the plan of interim National Government. Similarly it was
clear that the entire picture of Free India cannot be
visualized without agreement on the future of Indian States and State
Sarkars. The problem of the States failing to assume serious pro-
tection are long, and it is absolutely necessary that the different
Nationalities and Parties of the Indian People agree upon the
status of the States in the future Constitution of India.. so that
revolutionary forces successfully faced."
